FREDERICK WISEMAN'S 'IN JACKSON HEIGHTS' TO RECEIVE LIMITED THEATRICAL RUN AT MUSEUM OF THE MOVING IMAGE

MoMI presents exclusive Queens run of the film, just minutes away from where it was made

January 15-31, 2016

Astoria, Queens, NY, January 7, 2016—Museum of the Moving Image will present a limited theatrical run of *In Jackson Heights*, the latest documentary from Frederick Wiseman, a kaleidoscopic and novelistic view of the diverse Queens neighborhood of Jackson Heights. Since it debuted last fall, the film has been awarded Best Nonfiction Film by the New York Film Critics Circle, and Manohla Dargis in *The New York Times* called it "a thrilling transporting love letter from Frederick Wiseman to New York and its multi-everything glory." *In Jackson Heights* screens at the Museum—in Astoria, Queens, just minutes from where the film was made—from **January 15 through 31**, **2016** on Fridays, Saturdays, and Sundays (plus on Monday, January 18, Martin Luther King Jr. Day); see below for showtimes or visit online.

"We're very proud that this incredibly diverse and vibrant section of Queens is the subject of one of the year's most acclaimed films," said Chief Curator David Schwartz. "We're glad to have the opportunity to present the film to our local audience."

One of the most ethnically diverse and culturally diverse communities in the United States and the world, Jackson Heights is home to immigrants from every country in South America, Mexico, Bangladesh, Pakistan, Afghanistan, India, and China, who live together with descendants of earlier immigrations to America—Italian, Jewish, and Irish. The area is a true melting pot, reminiscent of the Lower East Side of Manhattan at the end of the nineteenth century. The subject of *In Jackson Heights* is the daily life of the people in this community—their businesses, community centers, religions, and political, cultural, and social lives—and the conflict between maintaining ties to traditions of their country of origins and the need to learn and adapt to American ways and values.

In Jackson Heights is Wiseman's third film about communities (the others being *Aspen* and *Belfast, Maine*) and his ninth film made in and about New York City institutions.

Since 1967, he has directed 40 documentaries—dramatic, narrative films that seek to portray ordinary human experience in a wide variety of contemporary social institutions. In October 2015, the Museum presented a <u>retrospective</u> of his work, featuring seven of his New York documentaries and a personal appearance by the director.

All screenings of *In Jackson Heights* take place at Museum of the Moving Image in the Celeste and Armand Bartos Screening Room, 36-01 35 Avenue, Astoria, NY 11106.
